1.	Welcome and introductions	ALL	
	welcomed attendees to the meeting and reminding attendees		
	that PHE is bound by Article 5.3 of the WHO Framework Convention on		
	Tobacco Control, and as such a note of the meeting will be published.		
2.	Notification requirements for tobacco and related products sold in the	ALL	
	UK		
	The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the requirement for all cigarettes		
	available to the UK market domestic, travel and retail sector, to be tested for tar, nicotine and carbon monoxide (TNCO).		
	The sampling procedure for such products was discussed, as was the		
	process for identifying genuinely "unique" products.		
	The UK's accredited laboratory requests manufacturers' to provide samples		
	for each cigarette with a unique Tobacco Product ID (TP-ID) as notified on		
	the EU Common Entry Gateway. A group of products under the same brand,		
	may meet the same specification and deliver the same TNCO emissions,		
	however due to alternative place of manufacturing or a slightly different 'Bill of Materials' would require a unique TP-ID.		
	It was agreed that PHE would discuss with the UK's accredited laboratory		
	laboratory about a revision to the process for testing, whereby they would		
	recognise batching of products under the same brand in order to reduce 2		
	duplication of testing, whilst also ensuring that all live products are tested		
	annually.		
	PHE to discuss with EU Commission and Member States about the process		
	for grouping together tobacco products (possibility by linking TP IDs, which		
	are essentially the same in composition, brand and emissions, differing only		
	in place of manufacture or similar.		
3.	Sampling		
	questioned whether there was any discussions taking place to		
	update the sampling schedule or methods for cigarettes.		
	responded that these were made following the appropriate ISO standards		
	and that these were not negotiable by individual member states.
