

# **Education in the UK**

The education system in the UK is divided in to five main parts:





Legally children in the UK must attend Primary and Secondary education which runs from 5\*-16 years old.

All children of this age are entitled to a free place at a state-run school.

# **Employment Rules**

The UK has employment laws that protect employees and ensure minimum standards:

- National Minimum Wage, details the amount your employer must pay you as a minimum which varies according to your age
- Working hours' time regulation states adults shouldn't work more than 40 hours a week for an employer unless you have specifically opted to do that in your contract
- Many health and safety laws and rules which are designed to keep employees safe.
- Non-discrimination laws that say your employer cannot treat you differently because of a protected characteristic (age, race, sex, sexuality, religion, gender, disability etc)
- Paid holiday, sick and maternity or paternity leave laws which outline the duration of, and amount of paid leave employees are entitled to in these circumstances
- Pension contribution laws that require your employer to have pension arrangement in place

# Housing in the UK

### **True or False:**

Zahra and her children arrive in the UK to live with her partner on a refugee family reunion visa. Zahra, knows that in this visa category she is entitled to public funds, including those related to housing. They need to find a new home because her partner currently lives in a shared house, and the family have to sleep in one room. They are overcrowded. She and family visit the local authority and ask for advice on their options and for help to find a new home.

Zahra is asked how to give information about anywhere she has lived in the UK. She explains she has only recently arrived and not lived elsewhere in the UK before. The council place her family on a waiting list and register the family to bid for council properties. Acknowledging they are over-crowded they offer to either move them to emergency accommodation 5 miles away in a hotel and register them to be able to bid on social housing, recommending they should also look for private rentals.



# Family Reunion and Refugee Visas Holders

- Pre-flight and post- flight partners should seek legal advice to check their options.
- Refugee and Refugee Family Reunion Visa Holders have multiple options
- Staying safe in your home
- Find a place in a women's refuge
- Seek support to the local council.

### **Homelessness application**

- You are homeless now
- You meet the Immigration conditions
- You are in priority need: at risk of domestic abuse including due to your gender
- You are NOT intentionally homeless
- You have a local connection: not for victims of domestic abuse


Registering and bidding for council housing

- How long is the contract?




# Creating an online account

# Key words

**Automated** – operating by automatic equipment rather than a person.

**Compulsory education** – the legally required period of time that children must be in formal education.

**Council Housing** – housing owned by the local authority, which is responsible for maintaining quality and affordability.

**Employment law** – set of legal rules which govern rights of workers and employers.

**Online account** – registration of personal details to access a specific service.

**Private rental** – paying to use something owned by a private owner, such as property.

**Public funds** – welfare support, benefits and housing assistance provided on the basis of low income.

**Translation** – communicating meaning from one language to another.
